

TRAINING TIP: Teaching focus on command - Being able to achieve eye contact from your dog as and when required can be a useful tool when it comes to unwanted distractions. I teach my dogs this using two methods. The first is to make my dogs sit for their meals, and only release them to eat when they look directly into my eyes. Put a word to the command such as "look" and reward appropriately. The second method is to hold a tasty treat in your hand to the side of the dog's head and give the "look" command. The moment your dog looks into your eyes, and eventually they will, quickly reward by giving the treat whilst saying good "look". Timing of the reward/praise is critical in teaching this command.

HDC FEATURE DOG

NAME: Trouble

AGE: 3yrs

SEX: Male

BREED: GSD

BACKGROUND HISTORY

Trouble was owned from a puppy but, due to circumstances at the time, was not socialised or trained in an appropriate way. As he became bigger, he became harder to handle and this took a turn for the worse after he was attacked at 8 months old. He began to see dogs as a threat and would be very vocal and rough. By the time he was 18 months old he was too powerful to walk even on a lead and by November 2018 he stopped having daily walks.

HDC HISTORY

Trouble came for a behavioural assessment with Sean in January 2018. He was a classic example of a large dog from working breed bloodlines who was spoilt with love but lacked appropriate discipline and training. The secure exercise fields were a good place for Trouble to burn off his energy without conflict. He needed his owner to be very black and white in setting boundaries with him, and once that was achieved alongside focused obedience in 1-2-1 sessions, Trouble was ready for group training classes.

TROUBLE NOW

Trouble is a familiar face at HDC. He has progressed from basic obedience class and is enjoying intermediate class where there is a lot more off lead work. He has started walking out in public and he loves playing with other dogs including puppies. He has progressed so far, that now he also helps other dogs with behavioural issues as and when required. Trouble is a classic example of the need to establish and maintain consistency in a relationship with your dog. There is no quick fix and it's down to the commitment of the owner being persistent that has made Trouble a sociable member of society.

Doggy Ice Cream Recipes

- 1 ripe banana
- 1 cup of peanut butter
- 2 cups of natural plain yogurt
- 2 tbsps. of honey

Instructions:

Mash the banana and then stir it into the natural yogurt.

Warm the cup of peanut butter using a microwave or stove until it's easy to stir.

Add the banana and yogurt mixture and the honey to the softened peanut butter.

Mix all ingredients until well-combined.

Pour the mixture into a non-stick container and then freeze overnight.

OR

- 1 small tub of fresh strawberries
- 3 or 4 cups of low/non-fat, plain yogurt

Instructions

Mash the strawberries using a potato masher.

Mix strawberry mash with yogurt and then freeze overnight.
